DESCRIPTION

Cereal Cultures is an international and interdisciplinary collaborative research project studying human engagements with rice, millets and wheat in South Asia (Odisha) and Kazakhstan. It combines three projects that are separately funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG) and the Dutch Research Council (NWO). Two of these projects explicitly focus on the changing roles of millets in local communities of Odisha, combining anthropological and archaeobotanical perspectives. One of these projects is Salvage Crops, "Savage" People: A comparative anthropological and archaeobotanical investigation of Millet Assemblages in India (NWO) and is led by Peter Berger and René Cappers. Roland Hardenberg is the project leader of the second, complementary, project, which bears the title <u>From "poor man's food" to "nutri-cereals". On the</u> Emergence of a New Millet Assemblage in Odisha, India (DFG). The third project — ResourceCultures of Rice and Wheat in South and Central Asia. Religious and (agro-) economic dimensions of cereals — is also led by Roland Hardenberg and part of the larger Collaborative Research Center on Resource Cultures (SFB 1070). It has been devised by Roland Hardenberg, Peter Berger and Jeanine Dagyeli. All three projects have been jointly designed and therefore have a strong conceptual and methodological consistency.

This workshop aims at discussing preliminary results of the research done so far and will address various other topics that are crucial for the further execution of the project (collaboration, International Year of Millets 2023, publications, knowledge dissemination, societal impact, among other things).
